Mountainside Lodge Estes Park, Colorado June 22, 1985

It has been a good reunion. It seems that all who attended feel good about their having been here. Mountainside Lodge offers so many advantagesclimate, a location only offers a wide variety of activities, and central location all help to make it a nearly ideal location for an occasion such as our family reunion. The members of the family who were not able to be with us were mentioned often and with wurmth and appreciation.

3:50 1.M. Maxime here. After our brief snow early this morning, the sun is now shining (off and on). Our carload will be leaving for Denver in about 40 minutes to get our flight to Dayton. This has been another great reunion -- with good fellowship and sharing. The pictures have just arrived; the group picture is very good, as are the individual ones. The Lord is so good. We thank Him for the Lennert Family and for this reunion!

8:45 A.M. This is Sam B. Things are much quieter now, and the dust is beginning to settle. Lucy, Phil, and I will leave about 9:30, and take Violet and Ken with us. we plan to take 5½ hours to drive across trail ridge road, sightseeing the nigh country, then on to Denver to get them to the planeby about 3 PM. Our drive back east will be more relaxed and with much less stuff. Winnie is by now (we presume), at boot camp in Florida training for her time in the Philippines this summer. This has indeed been a mountaintop experience, and we leave here with renewed vigor for the weeks ahead.

Without a doubt, the three new inlaws are delightfuladditions to the family. Besides their many other gifts and talents, Lamar and Daryl are very good pingpong players - I think that they did not meet in the tournament, but that would be a good match. Daryl emerged the champion of the tournament.

That doesn't mean I am planning on a 2nd **b**time!

There were several comments about the initiation. Winnie was put in charge of that and enlisted nelp from several sources. There were 3 parts to it: Knowledge (questionare), Cleansing (faking breaking an egg on their heads for an egg shampoo. There was an interesting mix of facial expressions as the "egg" ran down.
